




### How does the pass work?

## Improving Sibling Relationships

Sibling rivalry and problems between brothers and sisters are very common in many families. You can encourage more effective interactions among siblings by addressing how and why siblings treat each other as they do. Help your children recognize, value, and respect other family members by spending time discussing how and why siblings act the way they do. Recognizing the aspirations, motivations, and achievements of their brothers and sisters is an important first step in improving relations within a family. Here are some other ways to improve interactions among siblings.

## Force cooperation

Invite children to collaborate and cooperate with siblings. Encourage your children to use cooperative learning ideas at home. For example, have your children play nightly card or board games with each other to encourage sharing and taking turns. Give them Popsickle sticks, old newspapers, magazines, pasta stands, paper clips, or scraps of yarn. Ask them to take turns devising the weekly family crafts project. Ask for volunteers to assist one another in cleaning the garage or bedroom, assisting in nightly dish chores, or team laundry duties. Provide rewards or special treats when siblings work together to accomplish a goal.



#### Support collaboration in school

Suggest that siblings help each other study. Encourage brothers and sisters to help each other with homework. Hold friendly competitive homework challenges. Encourage them to read to each other sections of the newspaper, weekly magazines, or nightly stories. Help them to devise comprehension contests on what they read or studied.

#### Minimize defiance

Reduce and/or eliminate sibling's resistance, withdrawal, defensiveness, and rebellion. Set up family conferences on at least a monthly basis to help siblings deal with inevitable criticisms of each other or parents. During the structured conferences, ask brothers and sisters what they can say to openly acknowledge behaviors they would like to change in their siblings, parents, or themselves. Discuss what they believe causes family rifts. Talk to your children about the necessity of each family member having separate friends, independent time, and personal space as a means to avoiding arguments. End every family conference positively by asking siblings to state a strength they note in their brothers, sisters, parents, and self.

By fostering cooperation, supporting collaboration, and minimizing defiance, you can help your children improve their relationships with each other.





# LITERACY STRATEGIES AT HOME

Reading is not limited to books. Literacy is all around us. You can use the environment as a rich and natural setting to teach children to recognize words. Here are some strategies to try today.

- Environmental Print Point out words and signs in the environment when you're out and about. Show your child store signs, road signs and labels on products in the grocery store. Ask them to identify the names of stores you frequent.
- Reading Aloud When reading books to your child, have them follow the words with their finger while you read. This helps them connect spoken words to written text.
- Environmental Scavenger Hunts Create word scavenger hunts at home or in your neighborhood. While out for a walk, ask your child to find an item that starts with a letter. For example, "Can you spy something that starts with "B"
- Cooking Together While cooking or baking, point out ingredients and follow the recipe together. This exposes your child to food-related words and helps them understand the importance of reading for practical purposes.
- Rhyming and Word Play Engage in rhyming games and word play. These activities can help develop phonemic awareness which is essential for reading.
- Library Visits Did you know that as a resident of Leduc you can get a free library card? Regular visits to the library will allow your child to fall in love with books that interest them.

Remember that every child is unique, and their readiness for reading will vary. Be patient and provide encouragement as they make learning to read an enjoyable experience.

# NUMERACY STRATEGIES AT HOME

Math is a magical thing. Numbers are everywhere. You can also use our daily surroundings to teach all parts of numeracy. Here are some strategies to try today.

- 1. Counting Everyday Objects Encourage your child to count objects around the house or while you are out. For example, count the apples in the fruit bowl or the number of stairs while climbing. If you eat two apples, how many do you have now?
- Grocery Shopping Involve your child in grocery shopping by having them count items as your put them in the cart or compare prices to make choices
- Cooking Together This is not just a literacy experience, cooking involves lots of numeracy. Have your child help with measuring ingredients or setting times. Discuss fractions while cutting recipes in half or doubling them.
- Money Matters Teach your child about money by involving them in talks like counting coins, making change or budgeting for small purchases.
- Calendar and Time Use a calendar to teach days of the week, months and dates. Using digital clocks to show how long we have to get to an event.
- Board Games and Puzzles Play board games and puzzles that involve counting, sorting and strategic thinking. These games can be a fun way to reinforce numeracy skills.
- Online Math Resources There are plenty of fun math apps and online games to help reinforce math concepts. Need ideas? Reach out at <a href="mailto:jaclyn.smith@blackgold.ca">jaclyn.smith@blackgold.ca</a>
- Math Videos Have you heard of Number Blocks? This is a great show that teaches children to learn numbers and other numeracy skills.

Remember that numeracy should be hands-on and enjoyable. Be patient as your child explores and develops their numeracy skills at their own pace.
